

Tidbits about HarMar Shopping Center By Nancy Adomeit

HarMar was the creation of Harold Slawik and his wife, Marie, after seeing similar malls while vacationing in Florida. Construction began in 1961 at 2100 Snelling Avenue North. Harold would not live to see his dream come to frui-



tion; he died in the summer of 1962. Construction was completed under the watchful eye of Marie in 1963.

Last July during Rosefest, a city-wide celebration was held in Roseville's Central Park. The Roseville Historical Society (RHS) set up information and demonstration tables. The day started beautifully, but storms closed us down early. RHS had kids' activities of handweaving and making yarn dolls. We also had maps of early Rose Township and artifacts from the old days of market farms.

During our brief event, attendee Susan S. asked a question which was only partially answered that day by our historians. Her question concerned a hot air balloon which sailed quite low over her Roseville backyard. She remembered it happened in the 1980s.

RHS member Dallas Leier was quick to remember the event as a celebration put on by the HarMar shopping center celebrating an opening. Clearly, it was not meant to celebrate the center's opening, which had happened in 1963. There were several additional dates, however, on which large celebrations may have been held.

There was an expansion in 1977 and another in early 1981. On the afternoon of June 14, 1981, the HarMar tornado tore

through the shopping center. Fortunately, the mall received only cosmetic damage. The mall's ownership took the opportunity to update the facades and fix the damage that had occurred.

Again, in 1988, the mall underwent more updates and theater expansion.

It is hard to pinpoint either of the answers. This author has tried to follow up with numerous sources but has failed to find the definitive answer. I have several guesses based on information gleaned from my research.

1) A celebration of the mall occurred after the hurricane-necessary updates were completed later in 1981 or 1982. As part of that celebration a hot air balloon was brought in by one of the stores, perhaps to promote Wrangler Footwear or jeans.

2) Aquatennial – high flying antics.

3) Central Park acknowledged the installation of the first handicap-accessible playground equipment.

If anyone has information to share about this mystery, please call the author or RHS. Hopefully a definitive answer will appear in a future issue.

Another tidbit about HarMar...Did you know there is an Indie rock star who uses "Har Mar Superstar" as his stage name? I was not familiar with his work before writing this article, but what I have heard so far, it is quite nice.

According to Wikipedia, "Sean Tillmann-Hauser (born February 6, 1978) is an American singer-songwriter and actor. He has performed and released studio albums as 'Sean Na Na' and as a member of hardcore band 'Calvin Krime' but is best known for his work under the name 'Har Mar Superstar'.

May Program—Victorian Hair Weaving May 13, 7 p.m.

Judy Payne will present a program on Victorian Hair Weaving which is the art of using hair to make jewelry and pictures as a way of remembering loved ones and family.

Jewelry was used to remember lost loved ones. Pictures were made of the hair of loved ones. In the nineteenth century women and families often moved far from home and seldom returned. The picture could be looked at with fond memories.

From the website of the Rosenberg Library Museum we learn that hair jewelry, such as brooches, bracelets and necklaces, was made as a token of love or friendship or to remember a deceased loved one. Hair was also made into other items, such as small wreaths, and was also used in valentines and postcards.

In the United States the craft of hair weaving was popular in the 1800's but became much less so after World War I when women began wearing shorter hair styles. Nevertheless, how many baby books have a lock from baby's first haircut?

Join us as Judy leads a discussion of how the objects were made and used in a time of sentimentality.
